Subject: **Exploring Locality Planning**

Purpose: Strategic Planning Group to identify solutions and develop options on a suitable Locality Planning process. It is expected that this process will directly influence the User and Public Involvement structures used by the Health and Social Care Partnership (H&SC) and the Strategic Plan.

Recommendation: Strategic Planning Group to facilitate :

- a) Dialogue with member constituents on what Locality Planning means and should look like the North Ayrshire H&SCP.
 - b) Outcomes of Locality Planning engagement to produce options for delivery of locality planning which influence H&SC User and Public Involvement structures and strategic plan.
 - c) Strategic Planning Group to ensure engagement with key interfaces to ensure synergy with other locality engagement approaches.

1. Background

- 1.1 North Ayrshire CPP has developed a clearly defined Neighbourhood Planning approach. This has 6 agreed neighbourhoods – Arran, Irvine, North Coast, Kilwinning and Garnock Valley.
- 1.2 The Joint Improvement Team (JIT) produced an advice note in February 2014. Which noted that Integration Authorities are required to put in place locality planning arrangements.

2. Current Position

- 2.1 The JIT advice note makes clear that locality planning is 'place' focused and should set out how integrated H&SC functions will be carried out in each locality.
- 2.2 Localities should be the prime means for ensuring a more community-focussed, personalised approach to understanding and delivering better outcomes through the Strategic Plan.

2.3 The development of locality planning needs to consult a wide range of stakeholders in each locality.

3. Proposals

3.1 The Public Bodies (Joint Working) Bill highlighted the following Integration planning principles:-

(a) that the main purpose of services which must or may be provided in pursuance of functions which must or may be delegated under an integration plan is to improve the wellbeing of recipients,

(b) that, in so far as consistent with the main purpose, those services should be provided in the way which, so far as possible –

(i) is integrated from the point of view of recipients,

(ii) takes account of the particular needs of different recipients,

(iii) takes account of the particular needs of recipients in different parts of the area in which the service is being provided,

(iv) **is planned and led locally** in a way which is engaged with the community and local professionals,

(v) best anticipates needs and prevents them arising, and

(vi) makes the best use of the available facilities, people and other resources.

3.2 The Act requires Integration Authorities to prepare a strategic plan for the area of the Local Authority. A strategic plan is a document setting out the arrangements for carrying out the integrated functions, and how these arrangements are integrated to achieve the National Health and Wellbeing Outcomes.

4. Consultations

4.1 The SPG to consider on 28th August 2014. The Act states that where an Integration Authority, or an individual carrying out its functions, proposes to take a decision that might significantly affect service provision in a particular locality, they must take action to involve and secure the views of the groups of people as prescribed in the regulations.

5. Conclusion

5.1 The Strategic Planning Group to begin engagement with their existing key constituents and networks to develop a range of options for delivery of Strategic Planning. The Third, Independent Sector and GP locality group have met to consider their involvement.

- b) Outcomes of Locality Planning engagement to produce options for delivery of locality planning which influence H&SC User and Public Involvement structures and strategic plan.
- c) Strategic Planning Group to ensure engagement with key interfaces to ensure synergy with other locality engagement approaches.

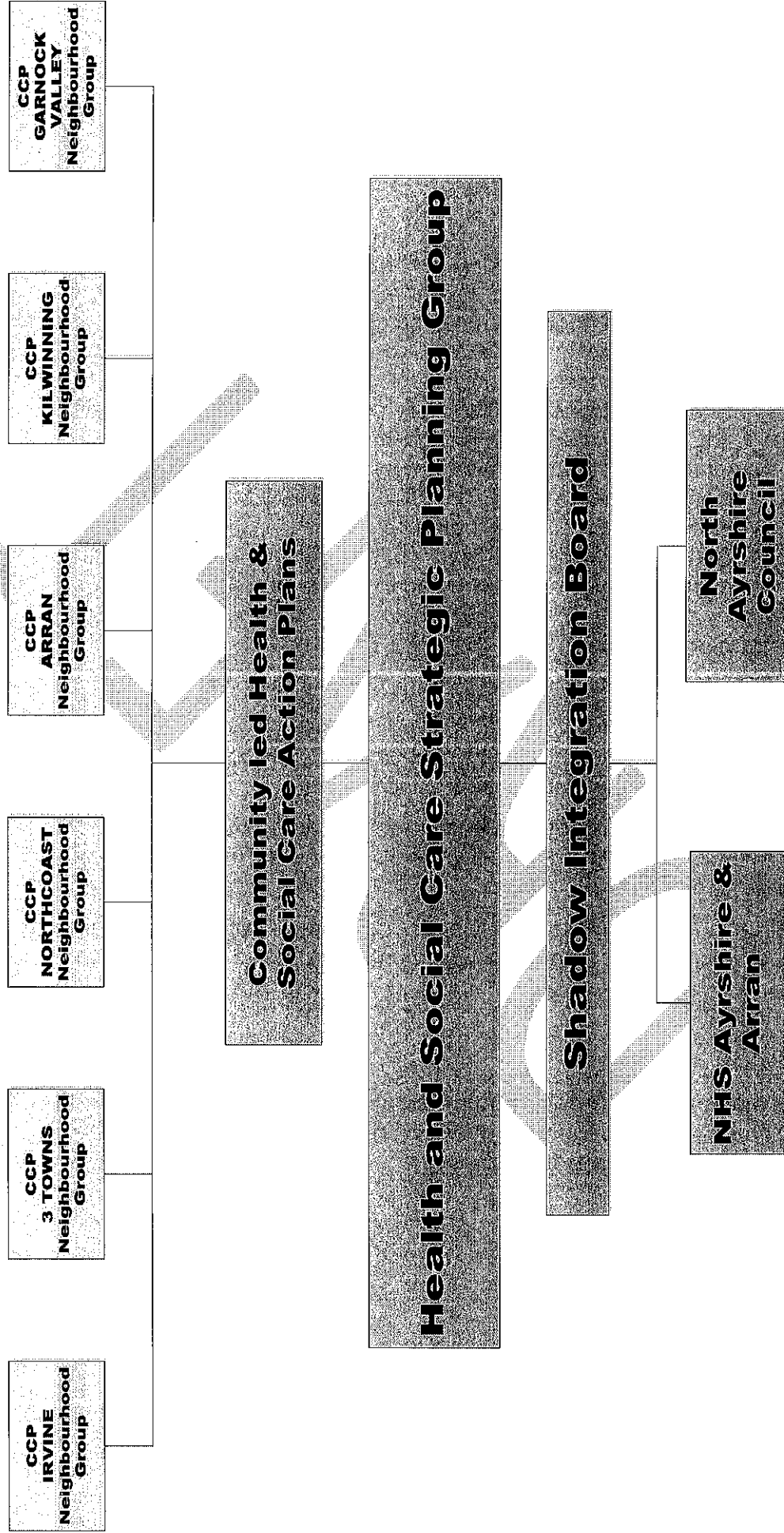
6. Recommendations

6.1 Strategic Planning Group to facilitate:

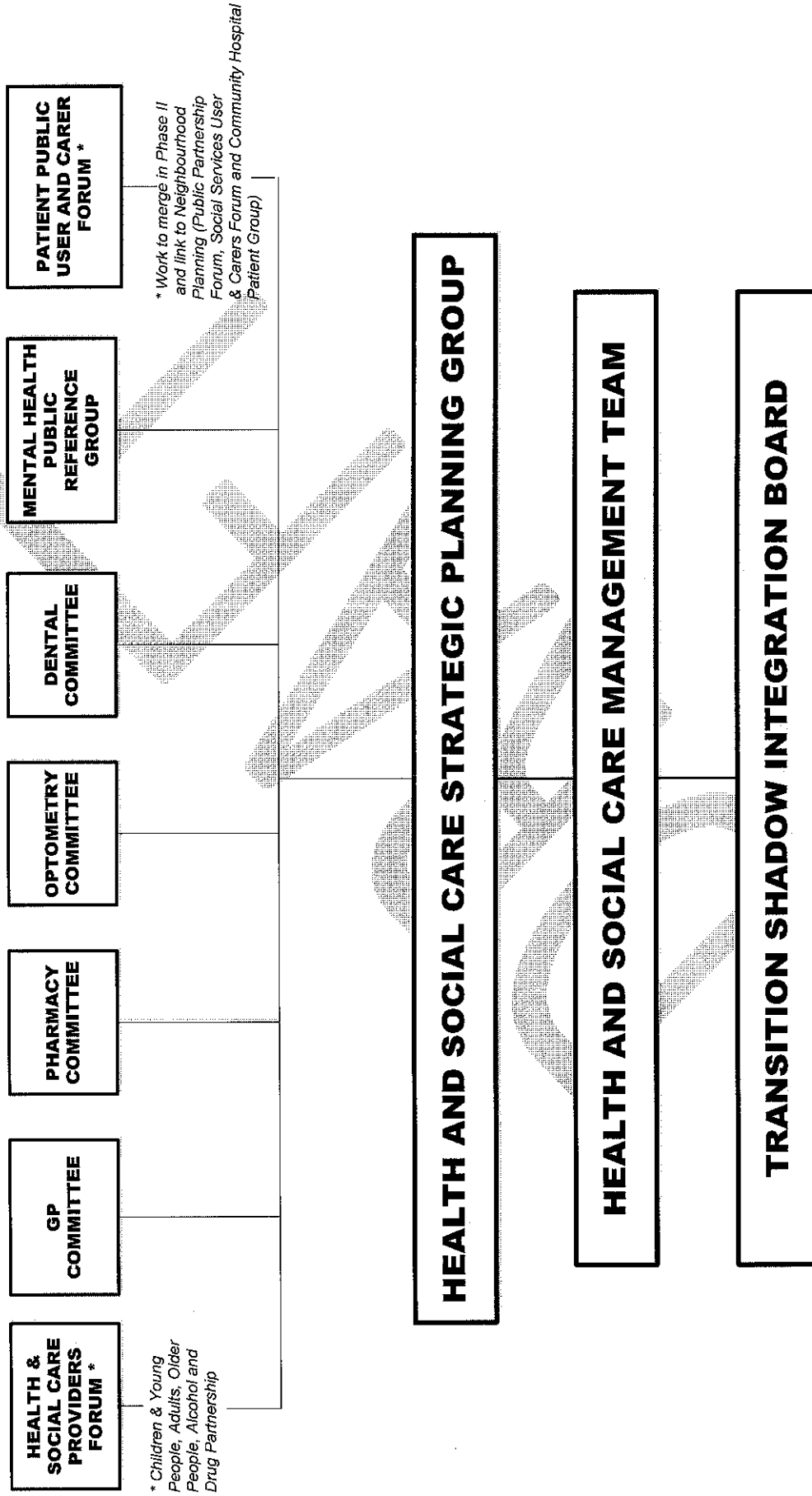
- a) Dialogue begins with members constituents on what Locality Planning means and should look like the North Ayrshire H&SCP.
